Courtyard Muncie at
Horizon Convention Center

The EGTI mission is to provide opportunities for post-secondary vocational training for people with disabilities that empower and lead to meaningful employment.

EGTI provides vocational training for a variety of jobs in the hotel, food service and healthcare support environments. It, along with its attached 150-room Courtyard Muncie at Horizon Convention Center hotel, is an immersive learning environment.

Also, EGTI is the first of its kind in the country and trains individuals

from across the United States. Graduates of the program may earn specialized certifications to assist them in obtaining employment in their home communities. Enrollees live at the hotel during their six to eight week training, where they not only learn specialized skills in the areas of food service, guest service, and cook, but also learn to navigate the community. There is also a healthcare support training program through Ball Memorial Hospital. Students have free access to Ivy Tech's training restaurant, Ball State University services, and other community opportunities. Scholarships are available through Vocational Rehabilitation.

Each student is provided with mentors from BSU to assist them

with their education, health & wellness, and socialization. Many of these relationships develop into long-term friendships after graduation. Students are also assigned job coaches to assist with employment development.

Because EGTI is located in downtown Muncie at the Courtyard Marriott, there is ample parking at the attached garage, as well as shopping and restaurants/pubs (including 2 at the hotel). The public bus system is within walking distance. The Muncie Children's Museum and Horizon Convention Center are both attached to EGTI. Canan Commons is located nearby, as are numerous specialty shops and entertainment.

Keynote Address



**Dr. Karyn Harvey, Ph.D.,
Assistant Executive Director of
Clinical Supports, Arc Baltimore**

***Trauma –Informed Behavioral
Interventions***

Dr. Harvey has worked as a clinician in the field of intellectual disabilities for over 30 years. She has a master's degree in Clinical psychology and a Ph.D. in Applied

Developmental Psychology from the University of Maryland.

She has published articles about therapeutic interventions with individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD), workbooks for individuals with IDD and two books. Her first book, *Positive Identity Development* was published in 2009 and presents both theory and guidance for clinicians doing therapy with individuals with ID.

Her second book, *Trauma – Informed Behavioral Interventions* was published in 2011 and presents a trauma- informed care approach to working with individuals with ID both programmatically and clinically.

She is currently the Assistant Executive Director of Clinical Services for the Arc Baltimore. She also consults with various state and individual agencies as well as trains staff, administrators and clinicians on trauma-informed care throughout the country. In 2016 she received the Earl Loschen Award from NADD for Excellence in Clinical Practice.

Dr. Harvey will present: *Trauma Informed Behavioral Interventions -- Social, emotional and biological causes of trauma in the lives of individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ID) are explored. Humanistic and effective intervention techniques are then taught in a hands-on manner.*

Dr. Rochelle Manor, Ph.D.

***Misdiagnosis of ADD/ADHD and
How the Wrong Meds Can Wreak
Havoc if it's Really a Sensory or
Anxiety Issue***

Dr. Manor is a neuropsychologist specializing in assessment from a holistic, developmental approach and in providing diagnostic clarification. She graduated from Ball State University's APA approved program in 1994 with a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology, specializing in Neuropsychological Assessment and Marriage/Family therapy. Since that time, she has specialized in developmental disabilities and helping families understand the unique aspects of their loved one.

She is an expert in assessing children, adolescents, and adults with neurodevelopmental conditions such as autism spectrum

disorders, acquired brain injury, mental health/behavioral issues, learning disabilities, and attention-deficit disorders. She also is available to conduct guardianship evaluations. In addition to clinical work, Dr. Manor serves as Director of Training at BRAINS, supervising emerging professionals. Finally, Dr. Manor has presented at local, regional, and national conferences, offered consultation to schools and medical professionals, and provided educational seminars to parent and community groups.

Creative and Therapeutic Approaches to Teaching Appropriate Behaviors

Learning new behaviors should be fun, not boring and hum-drum, both for our clients and ourselves as clinicians.

In this session we will discuss the importance of why and how to make behavioral interventions fun, exciting and interactive for our clients so they will want to learn and practice their replacement behaviors and other important behavioral skills.

Other topics that will be discussed are where to find creative resources and ideas in teaching our clients appropriate behaviors and creative ways to turn popular games and activities into a more exciting, fun and therapeutic experience. Lastly, once we learn why learning should be fun and how to make it fun, we will identify ways to keep all our learning games and materials organized.

Anne holds a Master of Arts degree in counseling and has worked in the field of I/DD since 2000. Previously, she's worked as a QIDP and an employment specialist. Anne became a behavior consultant in 2009.

Since that time, she has utilized her Bachelor of Science in elementary education and time spent as a teacher to help her develop creative and meaningful training materials to address the needs of the individuals on her caseload.

The ISO-Principle: Supporting People on Their Terms

Lindsey resides in Indianapolis, Indiana and works as the Executive Director of Music Therapy for Opportunities for Positive Growth (OPG) as well as the Government Relations Chairperson for the Association for Indiana Music Therapy. She supports a large Music Therapy department, which provides continued support to almost seven hundred people on a consistent basis. She is also heavily involved in state legislative efforts pertaining to Music Therapy access in the state of Indiana.

Music Therapists often use the Iso Principle to “meet people where they are.” As professionals, it is our responsibility to be person-centered with our approach. One size does not fit all, so we must quickly gage one’s current state and initiate our engagement based on the person’s specific needs. We can only then build rapport and create a meaningful plan for supports.

**Law Enforcement & Intellectual
Disabilities: Challenges and
Practical Solutions**

Jennifer Cianelli is a clinician supervisor for the Eskenazi Health Midtown Mobile Crisis Team. For the past two years Jennifer has collaborated with the CORE program through Indianapolis Emergency Medical Services in an attempt to identify possible reasons for repeat 911 calls in order to reduce overutilization. This collaboration has allowed for the submitting of an abstract regarding overutilization reduction to an academic publication for consideration. Cianelli holds a Master of Science degree from the University of St. Francis in Fort Wayne and obtained her license in mental health in 2012. She has

worked in the mental health field since obtaining her Bachelor of Arts degree from Huntington University in 1992. Cianelli is an active member of the CERT team and is a national certificated trainer for Mental Health First Aid.

Timothy Otsu is a crisis specialist with the Eskenazi Health Midtown Mobile Crisis Team. For the past two years he has been paired with an IMPD officer in the city's East District, responding to and following up on mental health crisis police runs. Data analysis revealed more police runs were made to Medicaid Waiver Homes than almost any other specific locations. This information prompted increased education to both police officers and residential staff members on how to address these unique client needs. Additionally, a multi-disciplinary committee of public safety officials, treatment providers, and representatives from the state has been established to address these concerns. Otsu holds a Master of Social Work degree from Indiana University; in addition to collaborating with the police he has experience working with individuals with psychotic disorders.

Law enforcement agencies are increasingly responding to individuals who are experiencing behavioral issues. Many of these

individuals may already be involved in treatment services and have a behavioral plan. Not every emergency responder has the knowledge of how behavioral plans are created and at times object when behavioral plans mandate calling emergency services. This breakout session will explore ways in which barriers between law enforcement and community partners can be addressed by increased communication and education for all parties. Over the course of a five year collaboration, Eskenazi Health Midtown Community Mental Health and the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department (IMPD) have identified a disconnect between first responders and service providers. This presentation will explore both continued barriers between parties and steps being taken within the Indianapolis community to bridge the gaps between emergency responders and service providers.
